Deafness Not a Problem


Resident care volunteer Karen Martz (Friday 7-11 AM) was born deaf. At age 2 her parents enrolled her in an intensive 5 days a week hearing and speech program in Buffalo. At age 5 she was

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proficient at reading lips and entered a mainstream kindergarten. She graduated from high school, entered RIT, and graduated with a degree in biotechnology. She was hired by Kodak as a polymer technician.

In 1988 she met and married Guy Martz. In 2001 they adopted a 15-month girl from China they named Julianna. In 2004 the Chinese International Adoption Agency called and asked, "Would you be willing to adopt a deaf child?" Karen said, "How could we say no?" The good news was that Bethany, a 17-month girl, was misdiagnosed. She could hear just fine!

Karen home schooled both girls. They both learned to play the violin and the piano and sang for years in the Eastman School of Music choir.



While Karen was acting as mother and teacher she was also volunteering as a caregiver to others. Before coming to WCCH she volunteered at Journey Home in Greece for over a decade. Since 2013 she has volunteered at our Home. often bringing her girls to help with a variety of activities, such as assisting with resident care and serving at spaghetti dinners. Watching their mother perform her hospice duties has influenced the girls' life choices. Julianna is enrolled in the nursing program at Monroe Community College. Bethany, a senior, will follow in her sister's footsteps this spring.

Thank you, Martz ladies, for being willing to share such a unique story! It is an inspiration to learn about your life's journey.

Winter Comfort Food

When our bookkeeper, Don Young, retired from Kodak he began a new career as "head cook" at the Young household. It wasn't long before he fell in love with Slow Cooker Cooking. He comments, "Slow cookers are great! The recipes are usually easy, and it's hard to make a mistake." This recipe, served at the Volunteer Fall Potluck Dinner was one of his first culinary efforts and has become a family favorite. Enjoy!

Favorite Chili

2 16 oz. cans red kidney beans, drained 2 14 ½ oz. cans tomatoes 2# coarsely ground chuck, browned and drained 2 medium onions, coarsely chopped 1 green pepper, coarsely chopped 2 cloves garlic, crushed 2 to 3 tbsp. chili powder 1 tsp. pepper 1 tsp. cumin Salt to taste ½ cup ketchup

Put all ingredients except ketchup in crock pot, stir once and cook on low 10 to 12 hours. (or cook on high for 5 to 6 hours.) Add ketchup during last hour. Garnish with shredded cheese and/or sour cream.
